ANTI-CATHOLIC VANDALISM - During the month of July reported acts of vandalism targeted Catholic churches across the country. Here are a few. At Our Lady of the Assumption Church in Bloomingburg, New York, a monument to unborn children killed by abortion was knocked over the weekend of July 18th. The monument consisted of an image of an infant resting in a pair of hands, along with an inscription of Isaiah 49:16. Parishioners at St. Bernadette Parish in Rockford, Illinois, discovered that a crucifix at a shrine belonging to the parish was smashed with a hammer on July 6th. According to parish staff member Kevin Riolt, the parish isn't angry about the vandalism, "but just sad that the (perpetrator) has a misconception of who Jesus is." On July 13th a statue of Christ installed in 1954 by the Knights of Columbus as a memorial to WWII veterans at a Montana ski resort was painted with brown paint and festooned with flags reading "Rise Up" and "#BLM," a presumed reference to the Black Lives Matter movement. A statue of the Virgin Mary was beheaded in Gary, Indiana on the evening of July 2nd. The head and hands of the statue were removed. On July 10th a statue of the Virgin Mary at Cathedral Prep School and Seminary in Queens was vandalized. According security footage an individual approached the 100-year-old statue and sprayed the word "IDOL" down its length." Fr. James Kuroly, rector and president of the Queens school, called this "an act of hatred." "We are sincerely grateful for the help we have received as well as the prayers. Please continue praying for those who committed this act of vandalism and hatred toward Our Lady and the Church," said Fr. Kuroly. On Saturday, July 11th police were called to the scene of an arson attack outside the church of St. Peter's Parish in Boston, Massachusetts. Plastic flowers in the hands of the statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary had been set on fire and suffered damage. Father John Currie, pastor of the parish, said he was not angry but offered to help whoever had committed the crime. "I know our Lady in Heaven is looking down on the soul, or whoever it might've been, and saying, 'I love you! If you need help, come get help. We're here for you.'" On the same day, July 11th, Queen of Peace Catholic Church in Ocala, Florida was attacked when a man crashed his minivan into the church and set the building on fire while parishioners were inside preparing for Mass. The man was later arrested and charged with attempted murder, arson, burglary, and evading arrest, after reportedly admitting to crashing into the church and then setting it on fire. Federal and local authorities are continuing to investigate a fire, again on July 11th, that destroyed the roof of the San Gabriel Mission in the Archdiocese of Los Angeles. Also on July

11th a statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary was beheaded at St. Stephen Church in Chattanooga, Tennessee. On July 17th St. Joseph Church in New Haven, Connecticut, a parish connected to the church where the Knights of Columbus was founded, a satanic symbol painted on the door. On July 14th a statue of Jesus Christ the Good Shepherd was desecrated and decapitated at Miami's Good Shepherd Catholic Church. On July 17th a statue of the Blessed Virgin at St. Mary's Cathedral in Colorado Springs was tagged with red paint in an act of vandalism. The vandal or vandals colored the statue's cross, and wrote the word "redrum" on the base of the statue. "Redrum," which is "murder" backwards, is a reference to the 1977 Stephen King novel "The Shining." In addition to the incidents noted above, other Catholic religious statues in California, Missouri, and other places have been toppled or vandalized by protestors, including several of St. Junipero Serra. We would do well to ponder where we are headed from here.

A TELLING ARREST - Two activists with Students for Life of America (SFLA) were arrested Saturday morning while peacefully attempting to chalk "BLACK PREBORN LIVES MATTER" outside of the Planned Parenthood abortion clinic in the nation's capital. SFLA had a permit and had communicated with the city about its plans to paint the street. This came following the city's decision to allow a private organization to paint on the street a message in support of defunding the police. SFLA was asked to use tempera paint and had planned to do so. D.C. Mayor Muriel Bowser famously renamed a street near the White House "Black Lives Matter Plaza" and had the slogan "BLACK LIVES MATTER" painted on the street there. Early Saturday morning, police stopped the pro-lifers' attempts to express their own message in paint. SFLA Strategic Partnerships Advisor Warner DePriest and SFLA student leader Erica Caporaletti from Towson University were then arrested on the scene. DePriest said in a Facebook live video that he was not read his Miranda Rights. The activists appear to have been charged with defacing public and/or private property. Video taken in the early hours Saturday shows D.C. police threatening to arrest Students for Life team members preparing to paint "BLACK PREBORN LIVES MATTER" outside Planned Parenthood on 4th Street NE. "After applying and receiving our permit for this event today, after being told by the Metropolitan police that the Mayor has... 'opened a Pandora's box' by painting public streets, we arrived to find six police cars threatening to arrest our team and students if they painted, even using the [tempera] paint we bought that the Police Department specifically requested," explained SFLA President Kristan Hawkins. "When we asked if we could at least use sidewalk chalk to chalk our anti-violence message on the streets, the police threatened to arrest us. In a letter to the mayor about the planned event, Hawkins and other organizers noted: "Having opened the streets of your city for public expression, Students for Life of America requests the opportunity to add our voices to those concerned about how people of color are treated in America. Black lives do matter, born and preborn, as too many people are lost in America today from causes that should be addressed and prevented for their disproportionate impact on minority communities ... Your original decision to paint 'Black Lives Matter' on the street is government speech. However, your decision to allow protestors to paint 'Defund the Police' opened the streets up as a public forum. You are not permitted to discriminate on the basis of viewpoint in making determinations relating to public assemblies in public [forums]. The message of the pre-born will not be silenced." Though only 13% of the female population, African American women make up 38 percent of all reported abortions. Four out of five Planned Parenthood abortion vendors are within walking distance of minority-dense neighborhoods, as noted in a Supreme Court amicus brief.
